Dearest Friends,

Welcome to 2025. The times they are a 'changing! While our challenges are no less than they were 13 years ago when I joined MtS Halifax, our financial sustainability is significantly better and thank goodness it is. It is a testament to you, our donors, community and church partners that last year and this winter we were able to address some large, costly and immediate needs that 13 years ago would have been a major challenge. It meant that we didn't have to shut down waiting to find funds to address those major problems.

We had to replace part of the roof and ceiling over the kitchen area due to water leakage and the heating unit on the roof needed to be repaired. Due to security issues the front doors had to be replaced. This past month, our mission van had to be replaced. You can appreciate the drain these expenditures have placed on our savings and now as the political and financial uncertainties of 2025 loom, we are bracing for higher costs for everything from gas and electricity to mission supplies.

Knowing you ' have our back ' makes facing the future less stressful. There is still so much more to do. After you view the photos of joy that our partnership brings to seafarers visiting our beautiful Port of Halifax, take time to check out the Seafarers Happiness Index. The results are not great. The realization that there is a growing disparity and continued inequality at sea proves that there is so much more support needed. There is a greater need for suicide awareness, which to some extent has been addressed by SafeTALK training for our volunteers. We look after medical needs through our Praxes Medical Group partnership.

Our ship welfare volunteers visit ships to engage crew members to establish their needs and address those concerns on the day of or over the weeks and months moving forward. We transport crew for shopping, money transfers to family members at home, or a visit for respite at our mission. These services alone demonstrate the value of a warm and secure mission building and a reliable mission van and the value of your continued support.

We continue to advocate for shore leave, social justice and spiritual support. With a team of one full time manager, a part time assistant manager and thirty volunteers backed up by partners like you, our wee mission in Halifax, Nova Scotia Canada is renowned internationally as a model mission. The work we do is critical as is the support you provide. We once again appeal to you to continue your financial support so that together we can continue to support our seafaring friends. Incredibly, past MtS Ship Welfare Visitor/ Chaplain Jason Flinn and seafarers, Jatan and Nyein (above) while recently visiting Halifax's Titanic gravesite had no idea that history would soon repeat itself, involving both seafarers from the MSC Baltic III. The men also visited the Titanic gallery at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic, where entrance fees are waived for seafarers. On February 15th, the Baltic Ill lost power in the Gulf of St. Lawrence resulting in the vessel running aground on the southwest coast of Nfld near the Bay of Islands. Unlike many crew from the Titanic all 20 seafarers from the Baltic III were rescued by the Canadian Air Force. This ironic coincidence is a reminder to us all how the risks of life at sea are not confined just to history. Thankfully for Jatan, Nyein and their crew mates, they did not suffer the same fate as those seafarers who now lie a Fairview Lawn Cemetery.

SEAFARER WELFARE ASSISTANCE PROVIDED

While working in the kitchen,

he injured his left-hand index finger, which became infected. He was brought to QEII Hospital on December 8th for surgery. This prevented him from working and, on the doctor's advice, was disallowed to return to the ship to avoid infection and complications. He stayed in the hospital for four days and then transferred to the hotel until his repatriation seven days later. Upon his transfer, he did not have money even for a cup of coffee. He lived on McDonald's meals for lunch with the \$100 the ship Agent gave him. Kent left Halifax on December 19th for his long trip home to the Philippines. He travelled to Montreal, Tokyo, Manila, and finally to his home in General Santos City in a southern Philippine province. With his repatriation, he has been spending his

first Christmas with family since 2020. Kenz is a young seafarer who has been sailing for four years. His elder brother has also been an international seafarer for seven years.

For Kenz, the \$200 financial assistance was used to buy food while waiting for his departure and when travelling back home. The Megga Sim will allow him to contact his family.

Last October 30, 2024, Joseph Loot donated a basketball to the crew of the Augusta Luna. Their last ball went overboard in the high seas. Note on one of the photos how the half court is set up onboard the ship. Note further the Mission logo painted on the backboard of the basketball ring. It is interesting to see how a small thing such as a basketball (or pool cues we gave before to the Gotland) can give big relief to the crew of a ship from the grueling work and monotonous life onboard. Sports are good examples of how seafarers relieve stress while the vessel is at sea. Thanks Joseph Loot!




